COMMANDER'S CORNER —

REUNION 2017 INITIAL INFO —

We now have a signed contract with the Marriott Hotel in SeaTac, WA for 5-9 October 2017. Why SeaTac and not Seattle itself? Rates are out of sight for our group in Seattle, many triple the \$99 per night rate I negotiated for in SeaTac, and it is only a two blocks from the Seattle Airport and their new Light Rail system that runs through downtown Seattle all the way to the University of Washington. The hotel provides complimentary shuttle service to and from the Airport and Light Rail Stations.

A “tentative” schedule proposal could be arrival, check-in and Hospitality Room on the 5th. Bus to McChord Field for a Wing Briefing and Museum/Air Park visit, followed by a visit to America’s (LeMay) Car Museum on the 6th. On the 7th, individuals can visit Seattle sights such as Pioneer Square, Pikes Street Market, Seattle Center and Space Needle at their leisure using the Light Rail system. The next day the 8th, the Ladies and others can visit the very large Westfield South Center Mall, while the aviation nuts go to the renowned Museum of Flight at Boeing Field. Later that night we’ll hold our Farewell Banquet at the hotel. Monday the 9th would be departure day for most, except for those who would like to go on a trip to Mt Rainier National Park.

Again this is a tentative schedule of events that will be firmed up by the end of the year. Right now I’m looking at a basic registration fee of \$110 per person, the tours being optional based on transportation and/or meal costs involved. So for now, save those dates, and we’ll provide more details around the end of the year.

A REMARKABLE MAN ... AN EXTRAORDINARY CAREER —

For a number of years, we have been in touch with an OCS grad of class 43C(?). Col. Gus Gikus is 94 years old and lives in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. During the early association reunion cycles, the distance was typically too far for Gus to travel; however, he did attend one of our class reunions in New Orleans as guest speaker. He has quite a history with the AAF/USAF, especially during WWII. Obviously, I think we would all enjoy having Gus attend one of the association reunions but that no longer appears to be an option. I'm afraid he has reached the end of his travels due to deteriorating back issues.

In absence of that, I've attached a paper (see Editor's Note below) he wrote a few years back (when he was about 89 as I recall). It highlights an incident in which he was involved, the genesis by which Francis and I came to know Gus. Francis lost a half-brother in that same incident, the sinking of the Rohna in November 1943. We had searched for years trying to determine how her much-older brother, Albert, had died, and we were finally able to take advantage of a class action Freedom of Information filing that revealed the heavy loss of life resulting from that sinking, claimed to be the largest loss of service life from a single sinking at sea. Indeed, Francis is one of the ladies interviewed in the video. Sadly, many of those interviewed in the video have since passed. But Gus remains with us.

We met Gus at our first attendance of the Rohna Survivors Reunion, to which survivors' kin are also invited. We immediately took to Gus; initially because his recollection of detail about the incident was so vivid and, too, the integrity with which he held to "real" facts about the incident rather than some exaggerations that had surfaced over the years. Gus did not know Francis' brother (separate unit) but was able to fill in unknowns for us about what likely happened to Albert, who was a member of the 853rd bedded in the center of the ship (see Editor's Note below). We subsequently became aware that the Tunisian WWII Cemetery containing remains of those Americans who died in North Africa during WWII also contains a memorial monument to those who were lost on the Rohna. (<https://www.abmc.gov/cemeteries-memorials/africa/north-africa-american-cemetery>) The cemetery is located in Carthage, Tunisia. It was dedicated in 1960 and, ironically, had we known then what we know now, we could have attended the dedication since Francis and I were then stationed at Wheelus AB, Tripoli, Libya.

Over the last few years, Gus and I have exchanged some memorable events through our careers. I've also attached a message containing one of his stories that you might find of interest. I have encouraged him to document all that he can remember. He was also involved in the experimental H-bomb tests in the Pacific in later years of his career. Gus is a remarkable man with an extraordinary career whose friendship we have come to cherish over the years.
